As we walk you through the maze we will explain the law as it is applied to all the most common problems that arise under Michigan workers' compensation law.

- How to calculate the rate of benefits
- The procedures followed in contested cases

- Professionals including doctors, lawyers, rehabilitation counselors and case managers
- Individuals who represent unions in dealing with workers' compensation

INSTRUCTORS

Nancy J. Day has specialized in workers' compensation for over 30 years, beginning in the mid-1970s as a workers' compensation representative for Chrysler Corporation and then as an attorney for Travelers Insurance Company. She is currently in private practice, as well as working on a part-time basis for Frankenmuth Insurance Company as a supervisor of litigated workers' compensation cases. Nancy has a BA from the University of Michigan and a JD from the Detroit College of Law.

He has specialized in practicing workers' compensation law for almost 30 years as a claimant's attorney. Steve has a BA & Masters Degree in Labor and Industrial Relations, both from MSU. Edward M. Welch is Professor Emeritus of Labor and Industrial Relations at Michigan State University. He was a faculty member here from 1991 to 2008 and established the Workers' Compensation Center that specializes in the education of workers' compensation professionals. From 1985 to 1990 he was the director of the Michigan workers' compensation agency. He practiced law from 1969 to 1985. He was a high school teacher before going to law school. He received a JD, MA and BA from the University of Michigan.
